
4th year Japanese and English major UVA Exchange: Waseda University, Spring 2017

I found a café called Freeman Café in Shibuya. The view looked out onto a street so it wasn't the most exciting, but the interior had a great 60s club feel that I really enjoyed, and the waiters/waitresses were really nice.

Most interesting/delicious cuisine tried

I found a chicken-based tsukemen restaurant! Tsukemen is dipping ramen (you get a bowl of ramen noodles, a bowl of broth, and you dip the noodles into the broth) and it was absolutely delicious!

Most meaningful experience abroad

I went to Okinawa and Osaka during a week of vacation from classes and was able to see the lesser known but still quite beautiful parts of Japan. I was so grateful that I was given the opportunity to go because Okinawa and Osaka were beautiful in their own ways and those experiences definitely helped me shape my understanding of Japan.
